

Northern Wobbegong, *Orectolobus wardi*

Summary

The Northern Wobbegong is a small-bodied wobbegong species from northern Australia. It is part of a species-complex for which taxonomy is not yet resolved. It is rarely encountered by commercial fisheries and therefore, there is no evidence to suggest population decline. Therefore, the Northern Wobbegong is assessed as Least Concern (IUCN) and Sustainable (SAFS).



Distribution

The northern Wobbegong is probably endemic to northern Australia. It is found from Cape York (Queensland) to Coral Bay (Western Australia) (Last and Stevens 2009). Records from Eastern Indonesia, and Papua New Guinea may be of another species (W. White, pers. comm., February 2015).

Stock structure and status

There is currently no information on population size, structure, or trend for the Northern Wobbegong. It is part of the 'wardi-complex' which is a group of similar wobbegong species whose taxonomy and population structure are yet to be resolved.

Fisheries

There are no identified important threats to the Northern Wobbegong. Its association with rocky and coral reef habitat prevents it from encountering most commercial fishing gear types. The threat of fishing is therefore minimal throughout its distribution.

Habitat and ecology

The Northern Wobbegong is found in often turbid waters associated with coral and rocky reef ledges and caves. It occurs at shallow depths. Maximum size is at least 63 cm total length (TL) but it potentially grows to 100 cm TL (Last and Stevens 2009). Little else is known of its biology.
